Overview:

If every Latter-day Saint is a steward, what does it mean to be a steward?

We are taught in <u>Gospel Topics</u> that stewardship is the "responsibility to administer or attend to the assignments one receives in a church calling, or to take care of those things with which we are blessed from God, including families, neighbors, and even temporal blessings." A steward is a person who takes care of something.

A parent takes care of their child. A farmer takes care of the land. A doctor takes care of sick people. A teacher takes care of their students.

Everything we have been given comes from God. One of the best ways to show our gratitude is by taking care of what we have. When we are good stewards, it makes Heavenly Father and Jesus happy.

Activity Ideas

Make a list of all the different areas over which you have a stewardship.

Think about the many roles of steward you play in your life. An adult might have stewardship responsibilities as a parent, a gospel doctrine teacher, a ministering sister or brother, a homeowner, and an employee. A child could have responsibility for their bedroom, their body, a spot in the garden, a pet.

Talk about specific ways each member of your family can take care of their individual stewardship with love to help it flourish.

Explain that the earth is also part of our stewardship. All of us benefit from the air, the land, and the water. When we keep our environment clean, we show love for our brothers and sisters, and for future generations who also rely on its bounty. Our stewardship is important for helping others.

Treat Ideas

Make fried scones! Teach your children that fry bread requires special attention and care in the rising of the dough and the responsibility around the hot oil.
