
#### Mission







#### Local and International Chapters

We believe that inspiring people to make a difference in their own community is one of the best ways we can increase efforts and make lasting change.

In 2021, we launched a new program to support and sponsor community-based stewardship projects through local chapters. We have formed six groups in the United States and two international groups. We have granted over \$2,000 for projects and are offering \$3,000 in 2022. Our goal is to add four additional chapters in 2022.



More than two hundred years ago, Joseph Smith made his way into a forest near his home to seek clarity and had a vision that was the basis for the

later founding of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. Particularly through the pandemic, many of us have found our own sacred places near our homes that have given us peace, clarity, gratitude, and rejuvenation.

Sister Sharon Eubank returned to speak with us in 2020. She offered unique perspectives on earth stewardship. Her role at LDS Charities takes her around the world where she sees the hurt caused by resource disparity.

Dr. Paul Alan Cox joined us in 2021 to present "Conservation and Reverence for the Earth". Dr. Cox was awarded the Goldman Environmental Prize, sometimes known as the Nobel Prize of the Environment and his conservation foundation, Seacology, has set aside over 1.5 million acres of rainforest and coral reef in 60 countries around the world.




#### Collaboration


# Sustainability



LDS Earth Stewardship operates an efficient budget, whereby most traditional expenses are avoided. Staff also operates from home, reducing carbon emissions.

At times over the past two years, LDS Earth Stewardship has been managed by one staff member. Currently, the organization employs three part-time staff members and has ten board members. We recruit interns for special projects and have created a volunteer program that can utilize over 150 volunteer roles.

We are grateful to our many individual donors and company match programs. Our most heartfelt gratitude goes to The Nature Conservancy, our largest source of sustainability. Without their support, much of the work in this report could not have been accomplished.
